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From Rev Anne.....

What times we are living in – Covid cases rising, daily briefings, constant changes, rule of six..... No trick or treating – not that I am particularly upset with that restriction.

No bonfire parties or firework displays. No big Remembrance services or Acts of Remembrance open to the general public. Christmas – watch this space but no Barnyard Nativity or Carols at Bransford. (You may need to book a seat/pew!)

This month we start on 1 November with our annual memorial service to remember loved ones who have embarked on their heavenly journey. Sadly, due to social distancing and restricted numbers in our buildings, we can only invite those who have had a funeral in the past twelve months and, unlike other years we will only be reading the names of those from our parishes who have died in the last year. However all loved ones are not forgotten since to live on in the hearts of those who have known you is not to die.

Next, on 8 November we have Remembrance Sunday – one of the best attended services in some of our parishes when the British Legion, uniformed organisations and many others who wish to remember the fallen, gather together. Across the Worcestershire West Rural Team (WWRT) we are holding an Act of Remembrance in every parish to which, following guidelines, limited numbers will be able to attend. However – poppies and crosses will be on sale in local shops, garage, pubs and if anyone wishes to

place a cross at a local war memorial they are

encouraged to do so before Sunday 8 November (or Wednesday 11 November). If you wish to donate to the Poppy Appeal, as the door sellers will not be around to you this year or you may be







Our District Councillors' "View from the Hills"

This month, no mention of words beginning with "C". Instead, let's celebrate some of the good things happening locally that you may have missed.

Sarah and I always enjoy supporting local organisations from MHDC's discretionary fund. We are allowed £500 each annually, so

no king's ransom, but we've been pleased this year to help Suckley's Good Neighbour and BFG Schemes, 1st Leigh Guides and Leigh and Bransford Badgers. Perhaps in 2021 we'll have some requests from Alfrick or Knightwick?

More widely in the district, £900,000 of funding has been secured for Malvern Theatre – a major tourist attraction – while the Splash renovation is proceeding well. Plans are also in preparation for a major revamp of Priory Park. MHDC has been recognised nationally as being in the top 5 of 188 district councils for financial resilience and second for enforcement of planning breaches. We believe that the council is as well positioned as any in the UK to provide for our community in 2021 and beyond.

On another cheerful note, Westminster's draft proposal to alter planning law appears to be on hold and that to create a Worcestershire "unitary authority" seems to be being quietly shelved. Both are a good result for local democracy. Perhaps our London masters may also have received the message that, as independent councillors, we are not willing to be pushed around.

Dyson Perrins Church of England Academy

It feels a long time since I have written an update for the local parish magazines. At the point of writing, we are fast approaching October half term and I think I speak on behalf of all our school community, by saying we are ready for a break.



On the back of the most bizarre term of my career in the summer, this first half term has been full of new routines, and I am delighted with how everyone has responded. Seven months ago schools were closed as our country went into lockdown. We had two days to prepare for delivering lessons remotely and get procedures in place to ensure everyone remained safe. Contrary to some of the coverage in the media, my experience of how school staff responded was simply amazing. Dyson Perrins remained open to children of key workers and vulnerable students throughout, including staying open during the school holidays. The number of students on-site grew during the summer months and we were able to invite Years 10 and 12 students into school on a rota from the middle of June. We provided free school meals and delivered food vouchers to families, and our pastoral team were checking the well-being of students on a daily basis.

Seeing staff develop their skills and confidence in using technology for live online teaching was a real highlight. Whilst it now seems a long time ago, I think that will stay in the memory for many years to come.

It would be remiss of me not to mention how proud we are of our Year 11 and Year 13 students who finished their time at Dysons in the summer. Their education was cut short after examinations were cancelled and they had to cope with a rollercoaster of decision making around how their grades would be issued, including changes made the evening before grades were given out in August. The final approach of Centre Assessed Grades was far from perfect, but I am confident our students received grades that were a fair reflection of their capabilities and students have been able successfully to move on.

I am delighted to share that Dysons reopened for all students in September and we have been well supported by families, with very high attendance so far. The new routines we have in place, from hand sanitising before entering every classroom, to creating separate year group zones at social times, are having a positive impact. Our staff are already having conversations about what we would like to keep post-Covid, if such a time presents itself. Our new Year 7 cohort has settled quickly and there is a calm, purposeful yet relaxed atmosphere in school. It's great to be back.

I do hope your families are keeping well. Kind regards.

Seven things to check if you're at risk of redundancy

1. Check if your redundancy is fair. There are rules to protect you from being discriminated against, and for being picked for redundancy due to an unfair reason. For example: you cannot be made redundant *because* you're pregnant or on maternity leave. If you are, this counts as "automatic unfair dismissal" and discrimination.

2. Check how much redundancy pay you get. You're entitled to statutory redundancy pay, which is the minimum the law says you're entitled to, if you've been an employee for two years. The amount you will get depends on your age and how long you have worked for the company. You won't get statutory redundancy pay if you've worked for the company for less than two years, are self-employed or are in certain professions. Your employer may also pay extra money on top of the statutory amount you're entitled to - this is called contractual redundancy pay. Some employees may be entitled to contractual redundancy pay even though they are not entitled to statutory redundancy pay.

3. Furloughed? Make sure you get 100% redundancy pay. If you were furloughed and then made redundant, your redundancy pay should be based on your normal wage. If you were paid 80% of your wages while on furlough, your redundancy pay should be based on your full wage.

4. Check your notice period. If you've worked for your employer for at least a month you're entitled to a paid statutory notice period. If you've worked there for more than a month, but less than two years, you have to be given a week's notice. For two years or more, it's a week for each full year you have worked, up to a maximum of 12 weeks. You may be entitled to a longer notice period as part of your employment contract.

5. Check your holiday pay. You'll be paid for any holiday you have left over when you leave. This should be at your normal rate's pay, even if you're currently furloughed on 80% of your pay. You can ask to take holiday during your notice period, but it's up to your employer to decide if you can take it then. Your employer can also tell you to use up any holiday you have left over, but they must give you the appropriate notice.

6. You might be entitled to paid time off to look for work. If you've worked for your employer for two years at the end of your notice period, you're likely to be entitled to 'reasonable' time off to apply for jobs or go on training. You can take the time off at any time in normal working hours and your employer can't ask you to rearrange your work hours to make up the time off. When taking time off to look for work, you'll be paid at your normal hourly rate, but only for up to 40% of a week's work - for instance for up to two days if you work a five-day week.

7. Check if you've got legal help via your home insurance. Often people get 'legal expenses cover' as part of their home insurance package, but many don't realise they can get free legal help to challenge their redundancy if they think it's discriminatory or unfair. It's worth checking the terms and conditions and speaking to your insurer if unsure. If you have a trade union at work, you could also contact them. Your union can help you work out if you've got a claim, and support you through the process, for example by going to meetings with you or negotiating on your behalf.

Churches, Digital Giving and QR codes

Another new technology inevitably coming our way has been to follow the general advice about minimising our handling of money and encouraging people to give by bank transfer or *Contactless/Digital Giving.* Bank transfer is generally the easiest and cheapest - we've just got to remember to do it, or ideally set up a **regular Direct Debit.**

Increasingly churches are using **card-reading devices** (Suckley Church uses a *SumUp* card reader where the on-cost is just 1.1%) - so remember to bring your bank debit card with you next time you come! If you've forgotten your card all is not lost - as long as you have your smart phone with you! Point the camera of your phone at the **QR code** (in Suckley they are on noticeboards and beside the donation box on the door) and choose how much you would like to give.

BE A GOOD BUSH TELEGRAPH! Make sure that people know about the Good Neighbour Scheme and that there are friends and neighbours nearby who are 'happy to help', or find help. There's probably someone living near you who is a GNS volunteer.

It is thanks to the Suckley volunteers that in the first wave of the pandemic several people were helped and housebound residents had their Suckley PO shopping brought to their doors regularly. Julian and Mark continue to have fresh fruit and veg as well as their usual stock-cupboard items. If a second wave affects our mobility and independence, keep your eyes and ears open to know how best to use Suckley PO for ordering your essential groceries.

Gradually more folk are bravely dipping their toes into the world of Digital Technology. We have several volunteers who have done the training necessary to support and advise these brave souls (within the limits of social distancing) - so do ask if you'd like someone to help you on your digital journey.


Covid Corner

Last month I discussed the importance of not catching Covid-19 if you are older because of the severity of the disease, the need for hospital admission and the chance of dying all increase dramatically with age. Also I discussed that while the young may not get a serious infection (in the younger age groups the majority may not even know they are infected) as all the evidence shows that as the rate of infection increases in the young, so the rate of infection will rise in the older age groups as well. If it were not for this fact, then one could see the argument for just letting the young lead totally normal lives.

We are facing a difficult long winter, and by the time you read this in November the temperatures will be dropping, people will be spending more time indoors, and opportunities for meeting much more safely outdoors are less. So how can we safely get through this winter?

Think of this virus like tobacco smoke (actually, not a bad analogy since tobacco smoke is an aerosol, and there is increasing evidence for aerosol spread of Covid-19). When outside smoke readily disperses, but indoors it can build up, and in a poorly ventilated room it hangs around so everyone breathes it in. The more smokers in the room, or the longer you stay in the room the more smoke you breathe in. The same with Covid-19; the longer you are in a room with an infected person the greater the risk of catching the virus, the poorer the ventilation the greater the risk. Some say that you need not worry about catching the virus if you are indoors with an infected person for less than 15 minutes. So, is 14 minutes OK then, or 13, 12 etc? No, common sense (and science) tells us that the less time you are in a room with others the safer it is going to be with no magical cut off at 15 minutes. Ventilation is also key to reducing risk. Draughts or opening a window regularly reduces risk. We all know when a room feels 'stuffy'. That tells us that there is poor ventilation with more stale air and more potential virus particles hanging around.

Another factor is the amount of virus particles an infected person produces. This relates to many things such as how infectious they are (and people



can be highly infectious even before they get symptoms). Release of virus particles goes up when talking loudly, singing or shouting.

And obviously, as you have all been thinking, what about the masks? Well at last the government has begun to 'follow the science'. In all situations masks will help reduce the amount of virus being shed by an infected person, and also the amount then inhaled by someone else, and we should not need Government regulations to make us wear one when mixing with others indoors, and outdoors when we cannot avoid being close to others. (Think of the White House Rose Garden). The better the quality of the mask the greater is the degree of protection. Thin cloth masks and buffs are much less good than multiple layer masks, and making a pocket in the mask to hold a piece of HEPA (high-efficiency particulate air) filter makes them even more effective. How do I get a piece of HEPA filter? Cut up a HEPA vacuum cleaner bag. Mask fit is also important, so keep your distance from someone wearing a mask with big gaps which can let out air, or if they are wearing their mask below the nose or under the chin!

Is there any good news in this Covid-19 pandemic then? Well, it does appear that the risk from particles on surfaces is less than originally thought, so the idea of going indoors to wash your hands singing Happy Birthday twice without a mask, is greater than the risk of staying outside.

So, keep safe this winter, use your common sense, and if you want to meet up with friends meet in fresh air.

Keeping in Touch

The year rolls on in this weird year called 2020. Our theatre remains closed, as do most theatres in the region and beyond. Whilst theatres do have the ability to open as far as government is concerned, restrictions apply so it's still not a viable option for us to do so.

Cinemas are also having a tough time. Cineworld has closed temporarily, but with no sign of an opening date. Odeon cinemas are considering only opening three days a week (weekends in fact) as there are only very small audiences at the moment. Vue cinemas too are looking at their current opening. So with this in mind it's still not viable for us to open, nor is there much around to even offer. New films are not being released as yet, so we just have to wait and see. Our drama company is also heavily restricted in what we can, and can't do, but has been busy (within the guidelines) and there will be more information about what they are up to in due course. Next time it will be available for more of you to see than we could allow with the recent Conquest in the Car Park event. Performing on stage is not an option again for us at the moment, but, soon there will be something for you to come and see presented outdoors.

Have you ever noticed the stage lighting at the Conquest? For the size of the theatre there is one of the most comprehensive arrangements of any theatre this size in the nearby counties! All thanks to a dedicated number of people over the years who have helped us grow from just the basic number of individual lights to allow us that very first production, to the array of lighting we have today. In the old "tin shed" days of the Conquest, lighting was controlled by old "slider" dimmers, which were attached to a wall in the



lighting control room. We had six of these sliders which meant at that time we could only dim or make bright six lights at any one time. These sliders were scary by today's standards as you could if not careful manage to accidentally put a finger just below the slider you were using and touch bare wires! Shocking!! Today at the existing theatre we have a sophisticated computer controlled lighting desk capable of controlling every single light we have, and they number around fifty now, enabling us to light the stage in many different ways, a lot of changes of lights are seen in pantomimes or in musical shows like the recent Chicago.

Also, have you ever noticed by the bar the words *Conquest Theatre* on the wall? This name is made out of people who generously gave money to have their names on the original seats in the "tin shed" theatre. John Blake cleverly selected some to make the name Conquest and we put it in the theatre to form a link from our original building to the current one. They had been well fixed to the theatre seats then, so was difficult for us to remove them. Take a look when you are there in the future and see the names of people on this board. These are fond memories of people, and the place.

Upbeat at Broadwas

Broadwas Croquet Club is tucked away in the Teme Valley on the border of Worcestershire and Herefordshire. We're a lively and competitive Club with four full-sized lawns and fifty-five active members.

This year a dry spring followed a very wet winter which made lawn preparation difficult, though not half as difficult as the ensuing Covid 19 pandemic. We could have caved in; put up the shutters and stood back until things settled down, but like other Clubs, that's not the Broadwas way, so we persevered with getting the lawns ready using our own skills and the expertise of a local contractor. Having received excellent advice and guidance from the Croquet Association we found ourselves back in business by the third week in May with an exhaustive sanitisation regime, but without the use of our pavilion and toilets and with all competitions, both internal and external, cancelled.

We also introduced a new lawn booking system under the eagle eye of our Club Captain and Secretary John Guy, so as to control lawn usage and record when each member was playing. A side benefit of this system is that our members are now spreading their use of the lawns over a greater proportion of each week.

In January we had embarked on an ambitious membership development programme mainly through local newsletters and Parish magazines. This generated plenty of interest, but then the pandemic struck. Rather than disappoint prospective joiners we kept all their contact details and promised to re-connect when things improved. The moment isolation was lifted we honoured our promise, whereupon we welcomed 38 visitors from whom 28 prospective members emerged. They all attended taster sessions and in the end 18 of them actually joined as full Club members. To introduce these new members to the Club and make them feel welcome, we appointed a New Members Secretary, Mary Dryden. Our sincere thanks to Mary for carrying out this important role in such difficult circumstances.

In parallel with all the other events of this year, our President, John Steel and our Chairman, Stuart Smith had been making formal approaches to Sport England for funding to create and kit out a new fifth lawn. Sport England provided us with a generous grant and we thank them both for the grant itself and for their support throughout what turned out to be a pretty rigorous application process. The new lawn has provided very welcome extra playing space that has helped to accommodate both new and existing members within the playing limits imposed by Covid 19 safety requirements.

In all, life in the Broadwas Croquet bubble has been very different, but we're more than managing. From the Alfrick and Lulsley Parish Council Meeting 22 October 2020 by Zoom

Planning and Environmental Matters; -

Clay Green Farm development: no information yet on the possible re-sale of this site. The council considered the *Government Directive* on Wildlife and Biodiversity. More discussion on the implications is to take place before a further review at the next meeting.

Committee on New Public Facilities

The Committee Chair, Cllr A. Cooper reported on the latest situation.

Key points:

- Formal statements are needed from the Village Hall and the Tennis Club stating that although they support development of the Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) neither wants responsibility for building or running it.
- VAT could only be reclaimed if the court is open to all, at all times.
- Work on the MUGA could start as soon as MHDC have agreed to our application for the Section 106 funding. The next MHDC S106 committee meeting for approval is January, but they can pre-check the application to make it as strong as possible.
- Children's play area. The preferred supplier is *Active Gardens* from Leominster. It is for a Toddler tractor and trailer with slide, a twin tower climbing frame with linking clatterbridge. On its side is a rock wall, net and ladder. The whole area is on a bonded rubber surface.

Footpath around the field: the 330 metre route has been decided and MCB Landscapes are preparing a quotation.

Highways and Footpaths

Gullies on the Suckley road between Alfrick Pound and Bridges Stone identified as blocked by the Lengthsman have been cleared by WCC Highways.

Playing Field

MCB Landscapes have completed the work of clearing ditches in a very satisfactory manner. **Clerk's Report -**

- *Knightwick Fencing* will be installing the new fence and gate this week.
- The Appeal against planning rejection by the owners of *Brownings Acre* has been upheld.
- Lulsley Broadband Project: the list of those asking for FTTP connections has been completed and the Government vouchers total more than is needed to meet the *Openreach* cost. This makes life easier – neither bank account nor Legal Entity is needed. The work is now with *Openreach* to complete the project.
- As an additional broadband project is underway, Cllr Messervy-Whiting contributed the following information. Suckley were already leading on the superfast broadband spur leading from the White House over Crews Hill down to Workhouse Bank. There are 20 properties from east of Baston Hall down to Garways. Of these 20 properties, 17 have signed up, of which at least 6 are eligible for the business vouchers. All these details have been with Worcester County Council's superfast broadband manager, who has been most helpful, since August. The subsequent hiatus has been between WCC and the contractor and a revised estimate is awaited.

The next meeting will be Thursday 26 November 2020 at 19:30 hrs via Zoom

Alfrick & Lulsley Parish Hedge Planting Working Parties

There are plans to plant a hedge on the two "bare" sides of the playing field at Alfrick. This will provide some shelter to people using the field and help with drainage but, more importantly, will add a long-lasting wildlife corridor to the landscape and provide places of shelter for wildlife. I have obtained about 800 hedging plants from the *Woodland Trust*; they were free because this is a community project. Working parties to carry out the planting will be held on

Saturday 7 November from 2.00-4.00pm and Sunday 29 November from 10.00am to 12 noon I do hope you can come. There will be tasks for all abilities so all are welcome. Because of Covid-19 restrictions we will need to split into groups of no more than six people and there will be a leader for each group. It should be easy to maintain social distancing within each group. Again, because of Covid, you will need to bring your own drinks and tools - just a spade and gloves. 3. Make sure you **tick the items on the Contents List**, as well as whether it is a Family or Unisex Elderly shoebox.



4. Tape the lid to the box to keep it secure and then wrap the box in colourful paper (not glittery paper as it is not easily recycled).

5. Tape your completed Contents List to the shoebox along the 3 sides marked in yellow.

6. Fold over the leaflet, and **if you pay tax** please complete and sign the Gift Aid Form on the back of the leaflet.

7. Finally, please tape along the 2 marked yellow top and bottom strips, and attach £3 (either 3 x £1 coins or a £2 and a £1 coin).

In support to the Malvern Hills District Council Food Bank (MHDC), with the backing of Sarah Rouse (Chair MHDC), Leigh and Bransford Badgers and Malvern Town Football Clubs are launching their combined initiative to increase supplies of key goods for our neighbours, friends, and residents. A Collection point has been established at the HDanywhere stadium in order to make donation at training as easy as possible. Research would indicate that one in five under 15-year olds in the UK lives in a home where the parents can't afford to put food on the table; there will be boys or girls in our club in just such a perilous position.



What to donate

Every food parcel, drawn from Food Bank donations, is aimed to provide a minimum of three days' worth of nutritionally balanced, <u>non-perishable foods</u>, to the needy in our local community. The following items are likely needed to make up a food parcel, so will always be welcome from our donations:

Cereal, soup, pasta, <u>rice</u>, tinned tomatoes/pasta sauce, lentils, beans and pulses, tinned meat, tinned vegetables, <u>tea/coffee</u>, tinned fruit, biscuits, UHT milk, fruit juice.

THE HALL WELCOMES OUR YOUNG PEOPLE



Poppies for Remembrance

For many, the <u>Royal British Legion</u>'s red poppy is a symbol of peace and remembrance for those who gave their lives in times of war. Over the years the annual Poppy Appeal, first held in 1921, has raised vital money to support Britain's Armed Forces, veterans and their families in their times of need. However, this is not the only poppy appeal which exists to promote peace and to remember wartime sacrifice.



The white poppy was first designed and distributed in 1933 by the <u>Peace Pledge Union</u>, the UK's oldest pacifist group. Many veterans of the First World War, and indeed, of wars since, opted to wear the white poppy to stress the 'never again' message and to visually represent their commitment to peace.

Black poppies are also available each year from <u>Black Poppy Rose</u>, to especially remember those in the African, Black, Caribbean and Pacific Islands communities who contributed to or who died during various conflicts since the 16th century.

Animal victims of wartime, like horses and dogs, are also remembered through the wearing of purple poppies. Organised by the <u>War Horse Memorial</u>, donations for purple poppies are given to animal charities including World Horse Welfare and Blue Cross.

Whatever colour you choose to wear, poppies remain an important symbol to remember all those affected by war.



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
